National challenges and solutions created with the Order of Malta	 Czech Republic is mostly a transit country for migration into western countries. If borders are crossed illegally, people are placed into detention centres – visits to detention centers Due to the above practice, Czech Republic was a "country of entry" for a large number of refugees. Some of them have been returned on Dublin IV recently. These refugees are applying for asylum in the Czech Republic, joining a group of asylum holders here – working with asylum seekers and holders The current (recently re-elected) President - Miloš Zeman - most politicians are against accepting refugees and take a strong anti-immigration stance The Czech government does not provide a sufficient support - neither financial or practical - to refugees. Most of the support they receive comes from donations or them finding work How to "wean from support"? Create minimum support that should be provided How to activate local churches to support Christian refugees?

Number of refugees	 2015 – 1,525 applicants, asylum granted to 71, 328 received supplementary protection 2016 – 1,477 applicants 2017 – 1,450 applicants
